## **Summary:**

To present for consideration the draft Public Spaces Protection Order – Coast and Visitor Areas (PSPO) under the Anti–Social Behaviour Crime and Policing Act 2014.

To provide information concerning Coast and Visitor Area behaviours and an overview of the public consultation on proposed additional measures through a proposed new Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO).

#### **Recommendations:**

**Licensing and Regulatory Committee** is requested to recommend that Council gives its approval for the Proposed Public Spaces Protection Order as detailed in 1, below:

#### Reasons for the Recommendation(s):

The proposals are intended to provide enforcement powers to protect the public from anti-social behavior that is having, or likely to have, a detrimental effect on the quality of life of those in the locality.

Alternative Options Considered and Rejected: (including any Risk Implications)

Members could take no action, following the PSPO consultation, resulting in only very limited powers to tackle anti-social behaviour on the coast and visitor areas. Existing By-Laws are dated in extent and coverage across the Borough. Crucially they fail to allow a Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) to be issued and for the offender to discharge their liability for prosecution by making payment. All offences otherwise would result in prosecution which is both costly in time and resources and would leave the offender with a criminal record.

Options considered as part of the public consultation included support for only some of the items proposed, and/ or the geographic areas to be considered for the Order, as summarised in the report.

#### What will it cost and how will it be financed?

#### (A) Revenue Costs

The costs of basic/temporary signage can be accommodated within existing revenue budgets.

Should permanent signage be required, this is estimated to cost in the region of £20,000. Other funding sources will need for be identified for this in due course. A further report will be provided and appropriate approval will be sought in line with the requirements of the Financial Procedure Rules.

It is not expected that there will be any material change in the amount of monies received from fixed penalty notices, and an additional contribution towards income is not anticipated.

## (B) Capital Costs

There are no direct capital cost implications associated with the recommendations in this report.

## 1. Introduction/Background

- 1.1. A public spaces protection order (PSPO) can be introduced by a Council under the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, Part 4 (section 59) where:
  - activities that have taken place have had a detrimental effect on the quality of life of those in the locality, or it is likely that activities will take place and that they will have a detrimental effect
  - the effect or likely effect of these activities:
    - is, or is likely to be, persistent or continuing in nature
    - is, or is likely to be, unreasonable
- 1.2. A public spaces protection order may not have effect for a period of more than 3 years, unless extended.
- 1.3. In establishing which restrictions or requirements should be included, the Council should be satisfied that the measures are necessary to prevent or reduce the likelihood of the detrimental effect continuing, occurring or recurring.
- 1.4. Before introducing, extending, varying or discharging a PSPO, there are requirements under the Act regarding consultation, publicity and notification.
- 1.5. Local authorities are obliged to consult with the local chief officer of police; the police and crime commissioner; owners or occupiers of land within the affected area where reasonably practicable, and appropriate community representatives.
- 1.6. The Act also requires that there is a consultation process before an Order can be made (and held again when an Order is extended, varied or discharged).
- 1.7. During 2021 the Coastal Teams within Green Sefton at Sefton Council reported almost 950 coastal incidents. The overwhelming majority of these (over 850) involved antisocial behaviour of one sort or another. The most frequent examples of ASB were related to the behaviour of vehicles / drivers on the beach car parks, off road motor bikes & quad bikes, camp fires and barbeques and dog and dog owner behaviour. Just under 7% of incidents involved abusive or threatening behaviour towards staff. By far the worst affected location was Ainsdale Beach, where nearly 60% of incidents were recorded with Crosby Coastal Park and beach area approaching 10% of incidents. The rest were spread across the other sand dune and beach areas controlled by Sefton. There were incidents recorded every month of the year, but most incidents occurred in June and July, and April was also busy with just over 15% of all 2021 incidents recorded.
- 1.8. By way of some very short examples from the Coast Teams reports (which is a far from exhaustive list), the following are from incident reports during 2021:

- Camp fire in dunes
- Quad bikes in no vehicle zone
- Fly tipping discovered
- Dogs in exclusion zone
- Vehicle speeding on beach
- Threat to report staff for challenging inappropriate behaviour in a vehicle
- Deliberate fires set in sand dunes
- Suspicious drunken behaviour
- Glass bottles smashed
- Vehicle parking outside of defined beach car park
- Motorcross bike in sand dunes
- Numerous barbeques
- 11 year old driver in beach car park
- Motorbike speeding along beach no vehicle zone
- Nude male in dunes
- Parascenders causing disturbance
- Driver spinning car causing danger to family
- 1.9. The proposed PSPO for Coast and Visitor Areas takes account of reported incidents, and is proposed to provide sanctions on issues that are already contained within the existing byelaws which can be found here; <a href="Green Sefton Byelaws">Green Sefton Byelaws</a>
- 1.10. The affected inland areas have been identified by the Sefton Council ASB Unit, and Merseyside Police, as areas being used by people to drink Alcohol and use the area to congregate and cause Anti-Social Behaviour and low-level crime. This order will enable authorised officers to request the confiscation of Alcohol from those who are causing Anti-Social Behaviour. If they refuse to hand over Alcohol, they can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice. This order does not ban Alcohol for those consuming it in a responsible manner.

## 2. Consultation and Engagement

- 2.1. The Consultation and Engagement Panel gave support for a public and stakeholder consultation exercise on the proposed PSPO which took place from 20<sup>th</sup> May to 24<sup>th</sup> June 2022.
- 2.2. A questionnaire was designed to seek views on respondent's experiences of anti social behaviour on the coast and in visitor areas currently, and their support or otherwise for the range of sanctions proposed. It also asked for comments on the geographic areas to be covered by the Order. Full details of the questions can be found in the results section of this report.
- 2.3. An easy read version of the questionnaire was developed, and the wording of this was used for all versions of the consultation.
- 2.4. The consultation ran online through 'Your Sefton Your Say'. Hard copies

- and audio versions were made available. Alternative language forms were available on request.
- 2.5. The Consultation was promoted through the Council website, My Sefton, social media, local press, Green Sefton rangers and notice boards in parks, on the coast and other recreational areas.
- 2.6. Over 300 groups and individuals were all contacted via email to inform of the consultation taking place and to identify any particular requests or requirements that group members may have. #### 4.0 Locations where the order will apply

- 4.1 As per the maps outlined in the consultation, and those included in the draft PSPO (see Appendix), the geographic area of the proposed PSPO include not only areas managed by the Council (coast, certain parks, town centres and highways etc), they also include areas managed by others such as the National Trust owned areas of the Formby Coast, Natural England's National Nature Reserve in Freshfield/ Ainsdale, Lancashire Wildlife Trust areas, and the RSPB reserve at Marshside. Although the Order is proposed to include these other areas, it should be noted that the council does not have resource to provide signage, nor enforce on other land owners land that will be for them to fund/ resource.
- 4.2 The Appendix also explains that the bulk of the proposed PSPO sanctions will apply to the coast only, with the (anti social behaviour related) alcohol confiscation only to be included for the inland locations.

#### 5.0 Signage

- 5.1 New site signage will be needed to educate visitors on the expectations of their behaviour when visiting these areas.
- 5.2 These signs are in development, and temporary versions/ banners will be sited immediately on approval of the Order and used for the remainder of Summer 2022. The costs of temporary signage can be met within existing budgets.
- 5.3 The permanent (more robust) signs will cost circa £20,000 and are not likely to be installed in Summer 2022 it is anticipated they will be on site in time for Summer 2023, subject to external funding (as existing budgets cannot meet this cost).
- 5.4 Upon formal approval, officers will engage a signage manufacturer to fabricate permanent signs to be placed at key entrances and other locations to inform people of the prohibitions in place, and alert them to the risk of a Fixed Penalty Notice should they be found to be acting inappropriately.

#### 6.0 Timescale

6.1 The proposed PSPO will run for three years after implementation, so from July 2022 to July 2025. Upon agreement at Full Council, officers will seek to promote its adoption both on site (with new signage outlined above, in noticeboards, in the press and on social media, and with face to face discussions with visitors). Assuming approval at the 14th July 2022 Full Council meeting, the Order will be live and enforceable for the remainder of the summer tourist season in July/ August 2022 and onwards.

## 7.0 Enforcement

- 7.1 Enforcement should be a last resort. Ideally, the simple fact that a Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) 'could' be imposed will, it is hoped, encourage responsible behaviour from visitors. However, the PSPO will allow FPN's to be issued by authorised officers whether they be trained/ approved council officers, staff from other land owners and agencies, the emergency services, or by approved contractors of the authority.
- 7.2 It should be noted that formal training is required to enable anyone to issue an FPN.

Although some agencies already have appropriately trained staff (such as the Police), this will take some time before others are ready (including Council staff).

## 8.0 Draft Public Space Protection Order - Coast and Visitor Areas

8.1 Subject to discussion and approval of this report, the draft PSPO is attached in Appendix C.

#### 9.0 Conclusion and recommendations:

- 9.1 The proposed PSPO seeks to maintain a balance between necessary controls to address unreasonable anti-social behaviour that is or is likely to have a continuing, recurring detrimental effect on the quality of life of those in the locality and takes into consideration the outcome of the consultation and views expressed by respondents.
- 9.2 Not proceeding would see a reliance on very limited byelaws, an inability to tackle anti social behaviour in all areas or to issue any Fixed Penalty Notices.
- 9.3 It is proposed that the following requirements/ restrictions summarised below are included within the proposed PSPO Coast and Visitor Areas, where clear support has been demonstrated through the consultation:
